Walking in the ways of St. Francis of Assisi





The Franciscan Brothers of the Holy Cross were founded on June 12, 1862 in a small village, Hausen, on the Wied River, in the western forest area of Germany. The founder of the community, Brother James Wirth felt called to do something special for God, for others, and for the Church.

Brother James listened for the voice of God throughout his young life, which prepared him to follow Jesus with a special dedication of helping young orphans. Brother James was an orphan himself. He wanted to build up God's kingdom by providing a home for orphans and to educate them in life skills and a trade. In this way, these young men would be able to contribute to society as Christians and to earn a living through their work.

Other young men saw what Brother James and his companion Brother Anthony were doing. They wanted to join them in their work. For the small community of Brothers, the development of the spiritual life of the Brotherhood was the foundation of their lives as Brothers. It provided a firm base from which they would be carry out their ministry of service to the sick, the suffering and those in need.

Brother James and his companions were always willing to help others in need. It was while helping people who were sick with smallpox that Brother James contracted the disease and died on March 28, 1871.

Brother James' model of discernment, of listening to God's voice and following in the footsteps of St. Francis of Assisi, is what gives us an example for our ministries today. We are determined to follow the call of Jesus in our lives and serve those who are in need of our Franciscan witness today. Obedience is a listening vow. It reminds a Brother to be open and aware of the changes in the world and the Church. Through this vow of obedience, a Brother is called to discover, through prayerful listening with his community, what God is calling him to and how he can respond.
